

Questions for the Feedback on the Project Material

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1. Could you understand the article and the PPT slides? Or did it require some effort from you, like checking the meaning of the words, reading the same sentence/s several times, etc?

I could understand perfectly both parts of the material provided, but it is true that I had to re-read some slides cautiously so I could understand them totally. In the case of checking the meaning of words, although with some I could deduce its meaning by context, in the case of other words I had to translate so I could have a total knowledge.

2. Was the summary exercise in *Wordwall* difficult, easy or average? Did it help you to understand the gist of the article?
